Garden Highlights, May 2023



Rabbit Ears Ruttya fruticosa comes from the high country of tropical East Africa where the climate is not too different from Geelong. It is also called Jammy Mouth for its dark shiny 'mouth'. In Africa, the sweet nectar, hidden inside the flowers, attracts hovering sunbirds and insects. African people used to pull off flowers and suck the sweet nectar. They also boiled the roots for stomach ache and to flavour soup. Women used its twigs to make sticks to part and plait their hair. The plant was used to feed cattle, goats and camels.


