## Garden Highlights, February 2017



The Geelong Botanic Gardens has 23 of its trees Heritage-listed. There are a further 9 Heritage trees in Eastern Park that surrounds these gardens. Trees are heritage listed for their age, grandeur, contribution to the landscape of the gardens and their uniqueness. 13 trees have state significance and the other 10 regional significance. Most of those with state significance have few or no other known examples growing in Victoria. The locations of all 23 trees are shown on the map over the page.

The Maiden Hair Tree *Ginkgo biloba* in the photo above is probably the first *Ginkgo* to grow in Australia for nearly 40 million years. Fossil Ginkgos have been found near Sydney. This tree was planted in the 1850s. Because of its age, this *Ginkgo* may also be the largest in Australia. It has a feature that appears as Ginkgos grow older - the beginning of roots, called Chi Chis, growing from the branches and trunk. These give the appearance that the tree is weeping.
